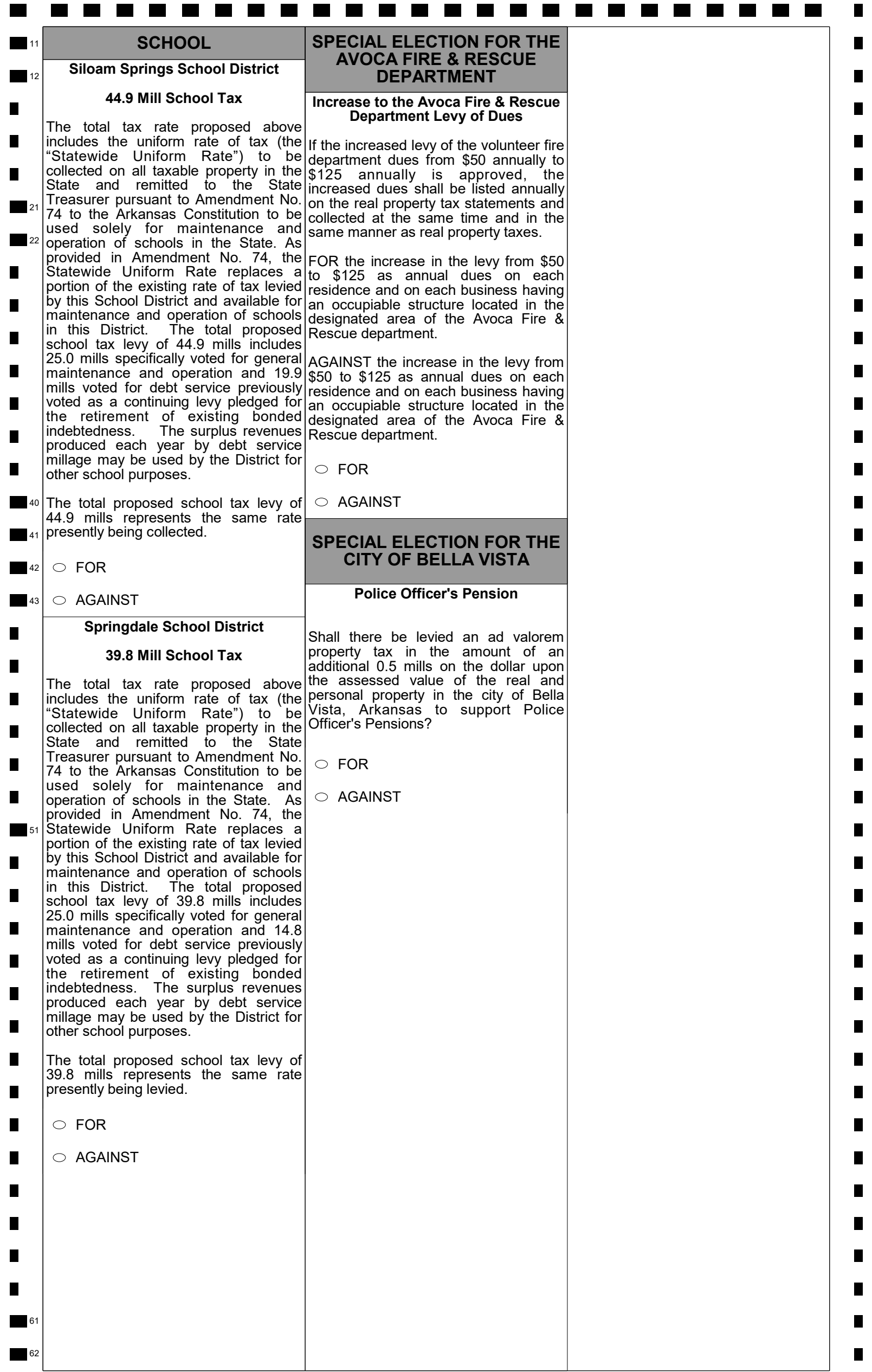

The total proposed school tax levy of 42.5 mills includes 25.0 mills specifically voted for general maintenance and operation and 17.5 mills voted for debt service previously voted as a continuing levy pledged for the retirement of existing bonded indebtedness. <p>The bonds described below that are approved may be combined into a single issue or may be issued in series from time to time. The City currently has in place a one percent (1.0%) City-wide sales and use tax levied under Ordinance No. 2017-37 adopted by the City Council of the City on July 11, 2017, which was approved by special election of the electors of the City held on September 12, 2017 (the "Existing Sales and Use Tax"). If one or more of the Community Center Facility Bonds, Street Improvements Bonds, Parks and Recreation Improvement Bonds, or Police Facilities Bonds are approved, there will be levied a replacement 1.0% sales and use tax within the City (the "Replacement Sales and Use Tax"), the net collections of which remaining after the State of Arkansas deducts its administrative charges and required rebates, will be used solely to retire the bonds and obligations of the City with respect thereto. If approved, the Replacement Sales and Use Tax will replace the Existing Sales and Use Tax. If none of the Community Center Facility Bonds, Street Improvements Bonds, Parks and Recreation Improvement Bonds, or Police Facilities Bonds are approved, the Existing Sales and Use Tax will remain in place along with the City's currently existing bonding authority with respect to the Existing Sales and Use Tax. If the Refunding Bonds are approved but none of the Community Center Facility Bonds, Street Improvements Bonds, Parks and Recreation Improvement Bonds, or Police Facilities Bonds are approved, the Existing Sales and Use Tax will remain in place and will be pledged to the payment of the Refunding Bonds. The effective date of the Replacement Sales and Use Tax, if approved, will be the day following the date the existing tax expires.
